Romans 4:14, "For if those who are of the law are heirs, faith is made void and the promise made of no effect,

Romans 4:15, "because the law brings about wrath; for where there is no law there is no transgression." v. 14 Logic:

Assuming that heirship was through the Law, faith would be nullified and so would be the promise;

Since neither faith, nor the promise have been nullified, the promise then is not through the Law;

Conclusion: The contrast Paul has been making is between righteousness by law and righteousness by faith (Rom. 3:27-4:8)–

Thus if by law than neither faith or promise have significance.

παράβασις parábasis; to transgress the law, law breaking

The Law cannot be obeyed-the result is wrath

No law, no violation of the law

Key point: The promise is for those who obtain it by faith alone in Christ alone.

Romans 4:16, "Therefore it is of faith that it might be according to grace, so that the <u>promise might</u> <u>be sure to ALL the seed</u>, not only to those who are of the law, but also to those who are of the faith of Abraham, who is the father of us all" Romans 4:17, "(as it is written, 'I have made you a father of many nations') in the presence of Him whom he believed—God, who gives life to the dead and calls those things which do not exist as though they did;"

adverb used as a preposition with the genitive

Contrary to, or, against hope In hope he believed Romans 4:19, "And not being weak in faith, he did not consider his own body, already dead (since he was about a hundred years old), and the deadness of Sarah's womb."

ἀσθενέω asthenéō; aor act ptcp with a negative Without being weak with respect to faith κατανοέω katanoéō; aor act ind, to observe, notice, consider, contemplate

Romans 4:20, "He did not waver at the promise of God through unbelief, but was strengthened in faith, giving glory to God,"
