Summary of the Doctrine of Adversity

1. Adversity is the outside pressure of adversity or prosperity; stress is the inside pressure of the soul.

2. Adversity is what the circumstances of life do to you; stress is what you do to yourself.

3. Adversity is inevitable; stress is optional.

4. Stress is always the result of sin nature control of the soul and failure to handle adversity through the gracious provision of the 10 problem-solving spiritual skills.

- 1. Confessing sin
- 2. Walking by the Holy Spirit
- 3. Faith-rest drill
- 4. Orienting to the Bible
- 5. Orienting to grace
- 6. Personal sense of your eternal destiny
- 7. Personal love for God
- 8. Unconditional love for others
- 9. Occupation with Christ
- 10. Sharing the happiness of Christ

5. The 10 problem-solving spiritual skills allow the believer to face any situation in life and remain poised, stable, and in control of the situation, no matter how horrible or agonizing, without giving in to the sin nature. 6. Sin nature control means arrogance and the operation of the arrogance skills, either in overt arrogance or disguised as pseudo-humility.
